CHAPTER 4 - DOURINE TESTING

Legislative History: Ordinance No. 7, authorizing testing of all horses on the Papago Reservation for dourine, was enacted by the Papago Council on April 5, 1941 and approved by the Sells Indian Agency Superintendent on May 8, 1941.

Related Legislation: Resolution No. 144, requiring that all horses on the Papago Reservation be tested for dourine, was enacted by the Papago Council on March 19, 1941 and approved by the Sells Indian Agency Superintendent on March 28, 1941.

Note: By its own terms, Ordinance No. 7 was to remain in effect “until all horses shall have been tested and declared clear and until the quarantine shall have been lifted from the entire Papago Reservation” (Ordinance No. 7, Section 2).

ORDINANCE OF THE

An ordinance authorizing the testing of all horses on the Papago Reservations for Dourine, and providing that all reactors be disposed of, and also providing that such horses being disposed of shall be paid for in accordance with appraisals made by a Committee appointed for that purpose.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PAPAGO COUNCIL:

Section 1. That in accordance with Resolution No. 144 of the Papago Council all horses on the Papago Reservations shall be tested for Dourine and all reactors shall be disposed of.

Section 2. This ordinance shall be in effect until all horses shall have been tested and declared clear and until the quarantine shall have been lifted from the entire Papago Reservation.

Section 3. As far as possible, this project shall be carried out in accordance with the attached list of provisions made by Committee selected from the Papago Tribal Council for the purpose of working out rules and regulations which will insure better cooperation of the Papago Tribe on this project.

Section 4. Any member of the Papago Tribe violating any provision of this Ordinance, or in any way interrupting or interfering with the proper carrying out of the work necessary in the eradication of Dourine from the Papago Reservation shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be prosecuted to the full extent of the Laws (tribal, state, and Federal), and upon conviction thereof shall be given the sentence provided for by these Laws.

This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and approval.

The foregoing ordinance was on April 5, 1941, duly enacted by a vote of 17 for, and 0 against, by the Papago Council, pursuant to authority vested in it by Section 3 (k), Article V. of the Constitution of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe on December 12, 1936, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 16, 1934, (48 Stat. 264). Said Ordinance is effective as of the date of its approval by the Superintendent of Sells Agency, subject to its rescission by the Secretary of the Interior pursuant to Section 6, Article V. of the Constitution and By-Laws of the Papago Tribe.

THE PAPAGO COUNCIL

RESOLVED by the Papago Council that we hereby approve and endorse the testing of all horses on the Papago Reservations for Dourine, and;

RESOLVED FURTHER THAT all re-actors found during the testing shall be disposed of and shall be paid for by fair and reasonable appraisals made by a committee selected for that purpose, and;

RESOLVED FURTHER that the work of this project shall be carried out as far as possible in accordance with an ordinance of the Papago Tribe which shall be drawn up to insure the proper and entire cooperation of the Papago Tribe in connection with the eradication of Dourine and the lifting of quarantine on the Papago reservation.

The foregoing resolution was on March 19, 1941 duly enacted by a vote of 9 for and 3 against, by the Papago Council pursuant to authority vested in it by Section 3 (k), Article V, of the Constitution of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe on Dec. 12, 1936, and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on Jan. 6, 1937, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 924). Said resolution is effective as of the date of its enactment, and of its approval by the Superintendent of Sells Agency, subject to its rescission by the Secretary of the Interior, pursuant to Section 6, Article V. of the Constitution and By-laws of the Papago Tribe.
